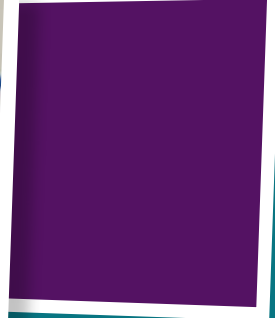

In 2019, The Duke Endowment distributed \$156.1 million through 421 grants, some of which were approved in previous years; 184 new grants were approved, totaling nearly \$181.3 million, some of which will be paid in future years.

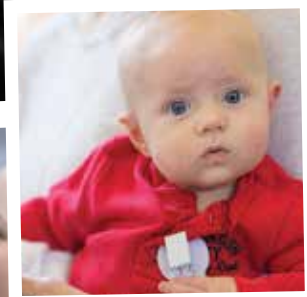
